THE LORD'S SUPPER

1 Corinthians 11:17-33.

The Lord's Supper is one of the most important events for the church (along with Baptism). In obedience to Jesus we try to do it often enough so that we may be enriched and strengthened by God

It is our human nature and need to keep certain occasions sacred. For example, we observe birthdays with a sense of gratefulness and unusual carefulness. New Year day and anniversaries are especially meaningful. God knows this need and therefore he assigned one day of the week for us to worship Him and seek Him together. He also instituted the Lord's Supper so that we may have it often and not forget what he has done for us and what we need to do.

Four Dimensions of the Lord's Supper:

(1) Looking to the Past.

The Passover meal was the time when Jewish families would gather around the dinner table and talk about how God delivered them from Egyptian captivity. It was a time of remembering God's mighty act of deliverance. Jesus used this important Jewish ritual to institute the Lord's Supper where we are to remember not the deliverance from Egypt, but the final and mighty act of deliverance from sin which he finished on the Cross.

We may forget some of his teachings or his other miracles, but we are instructed not forget the Cross where Christ's body was broken and His blood was shed for us.

(2) Looking to the Future.

The other new dimension Jesus introduced is the anticipation of the Marriage feast in Revelation 19:9. As he sat with his disciples for the first Lord's supper, Jesus' mind was clearly on the great feast of victory that is to come (Luke 22:16, 28-30).

Bread signifies basic need. The rich need it. But the poor especially need it. The presence of wine signifies celebration and feasting (Joseph Ratzinger).

(3) Looking Inside.

The danger of eating unworthily is huge (1 Corinth 11:30). What is this unworthiness? It is not weaknesses or limitations like a habit of drinking or smoking, etc (although they are never condoned). But the danger is lack of faith in Christ and what he has done.

We need to be honest and answer these questions to ourselves: (1) Will I enter the New Heaven and celebrate the great feast with God himself? (2) If the Lord were to ask you why He should let you enter His Kingdom, what would be your answer?

Any true born again Christian should be able to answer "yes" to the first question. The answer to the second question cannot be anything else other than the Blood of Jesus shed on the Cross and His body broken for us, which we remember at the Lord's Supper.

(4) Looking Around.

The other dimension the Bible introduces into the celebration of the Lord's supper is fellowship. The Corinthian church was marked by division, disorder and disrespect for God and each other. As a result Paul was angry with them and warned them that if they continue to eat the Love Feast (Lord's Supper) without repenting of these sins, they are eating judgement on themselves.

The Lord's Supper is not merely individualistic but a community experience marked by love, unity, sacrifice and sharing.

Conclusion: As we come to the table, we need to keep these in mind: (1) *Discernment*: Discern what is in your own heart, repent and deal with it. Also, discern the needs and struggles of other members and reach out to them. (2) *Dependence*: depend on the finished work of Jesus on the Cross for salvation and sustenance. Also, learn to be humble enough to depend on others for encouragement and growth. (3) *Direction*: what Christ has done is important, but what we need to do and where we need to go from here is equally important. The Blood and Body of Jesus provide the direction and the power to continue on the journey.
